VOCs, volatile organic compounds, are chemicals that evaporate easily at room temperature and can cause health problems. If these chemicals escape outside, they can contaminate and pollute the air.

Make the right first impression with a healthy, lush front lawn. Avoid using harsh, synthetic fertilizers made of salt that can rob the soil of essential nutrients. Instead, try to use organic herbicides and fertilizers that are made from biodegradable materials.

According to the EPA, bathrooms are the largest water wasters in the house, accounting for more than half of all the water that families use indoors. It's important to choose products that conserve water while reducing utility bills.
